Two albums, 11 million records sold and a Murphy Center sellout in 22 minutes.

Not bad for a band whose lead singer is a high school dropout and who was pumping gas barely three years ago.

Pearl Jam, fronted by Eddie Vedder,
makes its way to Murfreesboro Saturday
for a highly anticipated sold-out show,
with King's X opening. Pearl Jam remains at odds with the media craze surrounding it — they hated it when they
got a cover story in *Time* magazine and
reportedly prefer playing more intimate

club dates over massive, high-grossing

arenas.
Seattle's "alternative" export — including drummer Dave Abbruzzese, guitarists Mike McReady and Stone Gossard and bass player Jeff Ament — has nonetheless captured a mega-audience, selling 6 million copies of its debut album, Ten, and another 5 million of its follow-up, Vs., which also topped Bill-board's national album chart last fall.

Despite its anti-media stance, the group plans a free live broadcast of its April 3 concert in Atlanta to any radio station around the country interested in

airing it. And Pearl Jam is slated to guest on Saturday Night Live April 16, at the conclusion of its current tour. Another unusual twist for the tour: on April 4, the band performs in Rock Hill, N.C., in a show that won't start until midnight, allowing fans to go to both their show and the NCAA basketball championship the same night in Charlotte.

King's X, a hard-rocking trio that formed in Springfield, Mo., in 1980, is touring behind its current album *Dogman*. The band is best-known for its 1990 hit *It's Love* — marked by Beatles-que vocal harmonies. ^B
